#### **How Peer Pressure Undermines Success**



Will students pass up academic help based on how their friends feel? A new study suggests they will.

New research finds that peer pressure can adversely impact important educational decisions.

When SAT prep sign-ups at three high schools were publicmeaning that classmates could see who was participating—53 percent of students expressed an interest in the classes. But the participation rate shot up to 80 percent when the sign-ups were offered in a private setting that shielded students from the prying eyes of their peers, according to a study from the National Bureau of Economic Research.

Students in the study said that they expected their SAT scores to go up by at least 100 points by taking the prep package—a bump from the

50th percentile to the 69th percentile—but they were willing to sacrifice that critical improvement to save face with their peers.

"High school students are willing to forgo educational investment opportunities due to concerns about how they will be perceived by their classmates," the study concludes.

Interestingly, students with widely different views on academic achievement responded to the peer pressure similarly. Economists Leonardo Bursztyn, Georgy Egorov, and Robert Jensen looked at two types of peer groups: one that emphasized academics (students who believe it's "cool to be smart") and one that emphasized friendships (those who believe it's "smart to be cool"). Both groups of students avoided public sign-ups for the SAT prep.

Kids who felt that it's cool to be smart, the classic overachievers, didn't want their friends to know they needed academic help. The smart to be cool kids, on the other hand, associated a public declaration of interest in the class with a decline in their popularity.

The takeaway: Don't underestimate the effect of peer pressure in your school—it's powerful enough to get students to walk away from even life-changing academic opportunities.



#### 6 Types of Fun Summer Activities for Kids & Teens

Create family challenges: Establish a weekly contest

Play with your kids: toss water balloons, dive head-first down the slip-and-slide. Enjoy some quiet time together: family picnic, family board game night Make food fun: make your own ice cream, take turns choosing dinner options

Plan Projects That Can Last All Summer

Create a project that will keep your kids busy, but one that will also give a sense of accomplishment at the end of the summer.

Start a garden: start your own vegetable or flower garden. These promote healthier eating habits and improved psychological well-being

Encourage your teen to volunteer: Many organizations, like hospitals, accept teen volunteers. Participate in fundraisers for various causes.

Start a business: A simple lawn care business or dog walking service could be a great way to teach responsibility and earn some extra income.

Plan an event: Planning an event could help your child practice life skills, such as budgeting, time management, and communication.

#### **Promote Activities That Will Keep Your Teen Physically Active**

**Encourage your child to get active every day:** Challenge her to ride her bike five miles per day or to work out using an online video

Plan family activities that involve exercise: Go swimming as a family; go for a walk every evening after dinner. Look for new physical activities you can try as a family—frisbee golf, canoeing. Make fitness fun.

#### **Encourage Activities That Will Keep Your Child Mentally Active**

Summer brain drain can be a real problem, especially if your child spends his days playing video games. Encourage him to get involved in activities that will help him keep his mind sharp. Help him discover fun activities that encourage learning.

Think about the future: Visit a college together or help arrange for your teen to job shadow someone who works in a career that interests him.

**Encourage your child to read**: Visit the library or purchase some new e-books and challenge your child to read a new book each week. Encourage him to explore new genres or to start a book club with friends. Reading can help keep your child's brain active and it can turn him into a lifelong learner.

Use electronics in a healthy way: Rather than staring at a screen, encourage your teen to build a website or learn graphic designing.

#### **Plan Indoor Activities**

It's important to plan for those rainy days or searing hot days when your teen isn't likely to go outside. Find some indoor activities that your teen can keep in mind so she won't get bored. Here are some ideas that can keep her busy.

Provide art supplies: Art projects can be as simple as a collage made from old magazines or can involve complex crafts like sewing a new outfit. Encourage your child to write songs, create a video, draw pictures, and create poetry.

Encourage household activities: There are always things that can be done around the house. Let your child paint her bedroom a new color or assign her projects, like cleaning out the garage. # Be Prepared For The New School Year!

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School fees are paid directly into First Caribbean International Bank by cash or certified cheque, using the fee slip obtainable from the school. The amount is specified and must be paid in FULL. The bank will retain a copy, and hand three (3) stamped copies back to the payer. The payer keeps one copy as a receipt, and returns two (2) copies to the School.

#### **DUE DATES**

School Fees are paid in three (3) installments and are due on or before July 28, December 1 and March 1. Fees may also be paid annually in advance. Students will not be admitted to classes if they fail to produce a fee slip by the set deadline. Under no circumstances will students be allowed to write examinations unless fees are paid. Any other arrangements must be made with and approved expressly by the Principal/Director.

LATE FEE: \$50.00

INSURANCE: A MANDATORY student accident insurance fee of \$25.00 is billed to the School Fee payable August 1st

COMPUTER: \$50.00 per term EDLINE: \$5.00 per term

#### **TEXTBOOKS**

Secondary students are responsible for purchasing their own textbooks. Some texts are available from Nassau Stationers and others at the School. Parents are furnished with book lists and selling dates prior to the opening of school in September. Books are sold daily during the term from 8:00 a.m. to 8:25 a.m. and 3:15 to 3:45 p.m. The use of correction fluid is not permitted.

Primary Department: Textbook Rental & Supplies Fee: \$100.00.

The textbooks are on loan, and must be returned at the end of the academic year. Students are required to cover these books to help to keep them in mint condition. A charge is levied for lost or damaged textbooks.

Primary school students are responsible for purchasing their own Workbooks and Exercise books. A limited supply is available at the school's office. Nassau Stationers is our official book dealer.
